FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

Henry David Thoreau was a naturalist and philosopher who lived in Concord, Massachusetts, in the early 1800s. He spent a year living in a small one-room cabin in the woods at Walden Pond "because," he said, "I wished to live deliberately, to front only the essential facts of life, and see if I could not learn what it had to teach, and not when I came to die, discover that I had not lived. I did not wish to live what was not life, living is so dear." Thoreau seems to have sought the same reality pursued by the author of the Book of Wisdom, who preferred Lady Wisdom to power, deemed riches to be nothing, and loved wisdom more than health or beauty.

Like the man who comes to Jesus wanting to know what he must do to inherit eternal life, most of us have a difficult time surrendering that to which we cling. It may be our possessions, our power to control others, the need to be youthful and stylishly dressed, or an addiction to drugs or gambling or pornography—anything that has become our "best friend." Just as the apostles wonder who can then be saved, all of us wonder, because we, too, have one or another such "best friends." It is God who breaks through, says Jesus. It may be a painful breaking through; it may be an upheaval; it may not be until the end of our lives. Always, it is God who ultimately turns us around. ●

Stewardship Reflection on the Lectionary Readings
Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

WIS 7:7-11; PS 90:12-13, 14-15, 16-17; HEB 4:12-13; MK 10:17-30 OR 10:17-27

In our Gospel today, we hear the story of a man who ran up to Jesus and asked Him what he must do to reach eternal life. Jesus said, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." It says the man went away sad because he had much. We might cringe when we hear this story because it is sad — this man was so close to becoming an active disciple of Jesus, but instead turned away. We also might cringe because it could be deeply applicable to our lives. Jesus states that, "It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." One of the metaphors for the "eye of a needle" was a tight passageway into Jerusalem that people had to enter to get into the city. In order for their camels to pass through, they had to remove whatever the camel was carrying, only then, could they enter. If we look at our own lives, we can most likely think of something that we tightly carry with us. Maybe it is possessions — material goods or money — like Jesus references in our Gospel. Or maybe it is something less material — like status, pride or control. Jesus doesn't want our stuff — our job promotions, our designer house or our bank account. He just wants us. So, we need to be willing to strip those things from our lives in order to reach Him. It might seem difficult, but the outcome will be more than we could have ever imagined — peace on earth and treasure in heaven. ©Catholic

Dear friend of the Pope’s Missions,

I beg for your assistance in promoting World Mission Sunday, which the Church will celebrate worldwide on October 20. Catholics around the globe participate in this universal solidarity moment.

May I impose upon you to hang the accompanying poster in a prominent place in your parish to remind your parishioners of our shared missionary vocation and to learn about the work of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith? We all are responsible for praying for the Church, especially in the places where Christ’s redeeming message has yet to be heard, or has been forgotten, rejected, or shunned.

If we are to fulfill the great Commission to “go and make disciples of all nations,” or as the theme chosen by Pope Francis for this World Mission Sunday says, if we are to “Go and invite everyone to the banquet,” then we need to foster a missionary spirit within our parishes.

Education, awareness, and prayer are key for this. Have you considered praying the World Mission Rosary in your parish throughout the month of October? Have you thought about adding a prayer of the faithful that includes the Church in Asia, Africa, Oceania and Latin America, not due to ongoing conflicts in say, Ukraine or the Holy Land, but because there are billions out there who have yet to learn that they are loved by He who loved us so much so as to give his life for us?

The Society for the Propagation of the Faith, one of four Pontifical Mission Societies and the one behind the World Mission Sunday efforts, began when a French laywoman, over 200 years ago, answered her brothers’ request for prayers for his mission as a priest in Africa. She summoned her friends into prayer groups, asking them to pray daily and give a penny a week to the Church in the missions. Those first pennies, however, didn’t go to her brother: they came here, to the great diocese of Louisiana.

This collection of pennies became what, in 1926, Pope Pius XI called World Mission Sunday. Held each year on the penultimate Sunday in October, World Mission Sunday is an effort of the entire Church to help over 1,100 dioceses that cannot sustain themselves because they are too poor, young, or actively persecuted.

Every Catholic, regardless of geographical location, plays a pivotal role in embracing the missionary spirit. We are called not only to pray for our missionaries or send pennies to the missions, but also to become missionaries in our own right.

Thank you for your assistance in extending the invitation to the banquet to all this World Mission Sunday,

Dear Padre,

When should confirmation take place? I read that baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist were received all at the same time in the early Church.

Confirmation is one of the three sacraments of initiation. The other two are baptism and Eucharist. In the early Church, all three sacraments were usually received at the same time because most people receiving baptism were adults. As infant baptism started to become the norm, this sacrament was separated from the other two. After Vatican II, the trend moved the age of confirmation into the teenage years, so that in many places, confirmation takes place in seventh or eighth grade, or even later. There is still an argument among liturgists, educators, and theologians about whether such a separation should exist. Some think of confirmation as a coming-of-age sacrament, marking, as it were, the transition from childhood into adulthood in the Church. The theology of this sacrament, however, is based upon baptism and connects it to the commission to go out and touch the world with our faith. The ideal age for confirmation is the age at which we can, with the grace of the Holy Spirit, conscientiously and reasonably witness to our faith. ●
